



## SPRING SEEDING A NEW LAWN

As a rule, spring seeding should be completed by April 15<sup>th</sup>, depending on the season, in order to get it established before hot weather.

When seeding in the spring, you should plan on overseeding your lawn in the fall, around September 1<sup>st</sup>, weather permitting. We will be glad to advise you Around August 15<sup>th</sup>, on the best method to build up your lawn. This could include the addition of lime, compost/topsoil, fertilizer, aeration, etc. Plan to do this early in the fall, as you can't start in September until we have received some precipitation.

In most lawns it is not necessary to start over on your lawn. Usually if you aerate, power slice, seed and fertilize, then slice again, into your existing lawn, you will get a good stand of grass.

Also sow the type of grass you want to end up with. Do not sow a nurse grass. Remember what you seed is what you get.

When you hire Hillermann's to do your seeding for you, we will take responsibility for any grading problems or missed areas. However, we cannot be responsible for weather-related problems.

Depending on the weather, some spring overseeding may be required to get a thick stand of turf.
